
Picking Up Your Share:

When you sign up, you can choose a day to pick up your share at the farm.

When you arrive each week to collect your share, you will find a sign-in sheet and share bags. Sign in; this helps us to keep track of who has received their share.

Make sure you take the correct bag with your name on it. You may have more than one bag depending on your share size.

PLEASE RETURN YOUR BAGS EACH WEEK! This will help keep costs down.

If you need to skip a week, you can have a friend pick it up for you. If you give 48 hours notice, you may be able to change your pick up day for that week.

There will be no make ups for missed pickups. It is not possible for me to call and remind you of your pick up.

What is Community Supported Agriculture?

CSA

A CSA is a partnership between farmers and consumers. Consumers become members of a CSA by making a payment before the start of the growing season. Farmers provide a portion or a "share" of the farm's produce to CSA members each week throughout the season.

A CSA creates agriculture-supported communities where members receive a wide variety of foods freshly harvested from local farms. CSA farmers are able to produce a wide variety of high quality vegetables on a small scale near your neighborhood.

What are the Benefits?

- Naturally grown vegetables, harvested at their peak of nutritional value.
- A large variety of vegetables and herbs.
- The opportunity to learn how your food is grown.
- Support of the local economy, the community and local agriculture.

Where does my money go?

Farmers use members' payments to pay for seeds, fertilizer, water, equipment maintenance, labor, etc. throughout the season.

What you should know?

We are not a supermarket!

The vegetables that you find each week in your share are what we are harvesting at that time. You are NOT able to pick and choose as in a market. For example, you will not find tomatoes in your share in early July as they are not in season until later. Part of the commitment is to learn to eat what is in season here in our local area-you will find you become more flexible and adventurous with your cooking and eating habits. Each crop has a preference for certain growing conditions. There are some things that we cannot grow at all and others that have a very limited season.
